2024 BVU AGM

The Annual General Meeting has been scheduled for April 28th at 2pm. This meeting will be by zoom and a link will be sent out several times during the weekend prior to the meeting. Rentals update

We are now slowly accepting some of the applications made for rental requests at BVU. We are a busy church with lots of internal activities and needs for space, so we are being very careful not to pack our calendar with rentals. The board has been working on both a philosophical and theological policy for what rental/lease partnerships we will engage in as we move forward. Also, rental rates, rental policies, application forms and tracking programs have been put into place. We are taking it slow as we interface with those groups making requests. Thank you for your ongoing patience as we navigate in the new building and finding our way forward in sharing the space. As you can see, it's an involved task to oversee.

Electric Vehicle (EV) Chargers at BVU

The Electric Vehicle (EV) Chargers in the BVU parking lot are now operational. Charging sessions can be activated by those with a *Flo* account using a *Flo* card (not the App). The cost to use the chargers is currently set at 60 cents per hour which is approximately our marginal cost of electricity.

The EV chargers were installed as part of the recent renovations and are part of our commitment to support and encourage environmentally sustainable living.

These EV chargers operate as part of the *Flo* brand charging network, however, as they are intended for the use of people using the church facilities, they are not set to be visible to the general public on the *Flo* or other EV Charging Apps such as *PlugShare*.

If you have moved to BVU from another congregation and would like to transfer your membership to BVU, please contact the office by phone or email and we can initiate the transfer. On Sunday April 21st, we will be having a membership Sunday and both those who have been in the classes as well as those wishing to transfer their membership will be received that day. Volunteers Opportunities

On both a regular and semi-regular basis, BVU requires volunteers to help in various areas of ministry. If you are interested in helping in any of the following areas, please email Janiena at <u>info@broadviewunited.com</u> to let her know and a staff member or team coordinator will be in touch.

- Gardening: We have 2 people able to help during the week for some light weeding of the front gardens. It would be great to have about 2 more people. The total number of hours per week is likely less than 2.
- Hospitality team: We are currently pulling together folks willing to serve on the hospitality team. This is a coordinating function, and the team will meet to discern volunteers and oversight needed regarding kitchen and hospitality needs.
- **Property team**: We are in the midst of pulling together a team of 6 people to serve on the Property team that will have oversight in the day-to-day emerging maintenance or repairs for the building. This team will meet about 3 times a year and work on small projects as needed.
- PRIDE parade and celebration: We have historically had a good showing at the pride parade from all the various congregations that have come together as BVU. We are looking to pull together a small group (4-6) of people to help us co-ordinate both BVU and help communicate and co-ordinate with other UC congregations in the CRD. There is also a desire to restart the queer film festival that is also hosted during Pride week. Let us know if either or both of these events are of interest to you to help coordinate.
- **Communion servers:** We serve communion about 10x per year and each Sunday we do so, we require about 20 volunteers to help make this happen. If are interested in being asked for one or more Sundays during the year, please let us know.
- Host a meal for newcomers to Canada as part of Taste of Home: Many newcomers face social barriers, including language barriers and cultural differences, in their daily lives. We aim to break down these barriers by fostering meaningful connections beyond our comfort zones. To achieve this, we encourage participants of Taste of Home to pair up with volunteers from our congregation for home-cooked meals. If you are interested in hosting a meal, please contact Min-Goo at min-goo@broadviewunited.com. Your meal doesn't have to be fancy; A simple dish that you typically enjoy with your family would be perfect. RECONCILIATION ARTWORK

On Wednesday March 13th about 80 people gathered for the unveiling of the Reconciliation Artwork created by Indigenous artist Rande Cook. Members of his extended family and elders joined folks from BVU as we listened to Rande speak about the process, the vision of the artwork and words from elders/family members about their past and their hopes for the future. The Artwork is entitled **"FOR THE LOVE OF CHILDREN"**.

These are Rande's words:

"In this piece, I delve into the profound and often painful histories that shadow over Canada's Indigenous peoples, drawing upon the somber narratives of residential schools, the forced relocations to reserves, and the aggressive extraction of natural resources from lands that have been home to these communities for millennia. Through my work, I aim not only to confront and acknowledge these



injustices but also to illuminate the enduring strength, resilience, and unity of Indigenous peoples as they navigate the process of healing and reconciliation.

The art serves as a bridge between the past's dark chapters and the hopeful, determined stride towards a future where such histories are not repeated but remembered as lessons for preserving dignity, rights, and safe environments for all Indigenous communities. It is with a deep sense of responsibility and reverence that I present this piece, hoping to contribute to the ongoing dialogue around reconciliation, healing, and the collective effort in

paving a way towards a just and equitable future for the coming generations.

As viewers engage with the artwork, I invite them to reflect on the themes of resilience, unity, and healing, recognizing the significance of these processes not only for Indigenous communities but for society as a whole. It is through understanding, empathy, and shared commitments to justice that we can all contribute to the healing journey, making strides together towards creating a future that upholds the dignity and safety of every individual."

Thank you to Rande for sharing his artistic talents; to his extended family and elders for gracing us with their words and presence; for those who helped with hospitality; for the quilters, their gifts of quilts that we also blessed that evening; for those who have made a cash gift to support the creation of this work and for all those who attended the event on March 13th.



2 years ago, BVU was also presented with the opportunity to be a founding partner in the purchase of the entire JLF National enterprise with a number of other charities and private investors who saw an opportunity for social enterprise and acquisition that could change the conversation about capitalism and business practices and be both sustainable and compassionate. Carla Leon, formerly of the national church's EDGE program took on the position of CEO as be ventured into a new and dynamic possibility. A book about this whole process and more has just been published and is entitled <u>WIN</u> WIN CAPITALISM: How social acquisitions will change the face of business. BVU is featured prominently in this book and 150 copies will be coming soon for folks to be able to access and read.

second franchise a year later which gave us the whole island as our territory. Through the last 4 years we have learned a lot about homecare and have changed the landscape of what guality compassionate and relational based homecare could look like. Since that time, we have divided the franchise into 5 parts to make the territories more manageable so that the quality of care could be sustainable as the business grew.

This social enterprise business has grown from 0 income and clients in Jan of 2020 to over 50 clients and caregivers and a gross operating budget of 1.2M toward the end of 2023. It's now grown to a place where we needed to make some hard decisions. The BVU Just like family board has decided together with the CEO and ministry staff that it was time to sell this venture as the time and energy commitment has outpaced what is practical for us. 3 of the 5 territories have been sold as of March 1st, 2024, and the remaining are in process. The return to BVU from the sale of these has been 10-fold of its initial investment. Funds from the sale will continue to support the work of BVU in the years to come and provide seed money for our next social enterprise venture. Many thanks to the board for their faithful work and especially to Sarah Bowder, our founding CEO for all the hard work she put into making this venture such a successful one.



Our customers are finding the path to our doorway and sales have been steady as we find treasures to dust off and repurpose with new owners. In fact, our sales for nine days in March were approximately \$13,600. Congratulations to all the volunteers that have committed their time and energy to the success of store and the church in general.

Our Spring direction includes a new (but well known) member to our board, Ann Harris. Ann will chair the fellowship committee for the store and will bring ideas that enhance the volunteer experience for all. Ann, along with Marilyn Smith, John Davoren, Dave and Gail Murdock, have worked tirelessly during the transition from



construction to re-opening of the store and now will turn their attention to the fellowship of our group. Our circle gathering for volunteers just before the Easter weekend is an example of Ann's evolving role.

Did you know that there are about 18 different non-profit organizations and initiatives that benefit directly from the efforts of our volunteers. One of those entities is Victoria's SPCA. Sheets and blankets and that may not be suitable for human repurposing can be cut and shaped to provide bedding for our animal friends.

With the first of April just past us, we will start using our colour codes for price tickets. April is pink! Like the cherry blossoms! The colours help us know how long something has been on a shelf or rack and when it is time to let it go and replace it with the next treasure. Perhaps we will have to have some special solar eclipse pricing!

Towards a Deeper Understanding of the Toxic Drug Crisis, May 15th 10am – 12pm

Have you been troubled and confused about the Fentanyl toxic drug poisoning that's killing many Victorian and others throughout our province.

Since BC called the Provincial Public Health Emergency, in 2016, over 14,000 British Columbians have lost their lives, seven people in BC are dying every day. It is the leading cause of death in our province, killing primarily young people between the ages of 19 to 45, and disproportionately impacting First Nations people.

This lost of lives has an immense impact on our community affecting families, friends and coworkers; leaving loved ones grieving, stigmatized and alone.

It is a complex issues, which raises many questions and demands our attention:

What is the opioid crisis? Why is Fentanyl killing so many people? Why do people start using drugs? Why can't they stop? Is providing "safe drugs" giving up on people? How can we solve this crisis? How can we address this crisis with care, compassion, understanding and concrete actions? What is our response as a community of faith?

What does "deep spirituality, bold discipleship and daring justice" look like?

Sometimes it looks like the Gaza Ceasefire Pilgrimage Walk. On March 16th, almost 200 people were involved in the 21 km walk: they were walkers, volunteers, reflection leaders, and supporters who came out to the stopping points to lift up the cause that connected all of us. People of diverse ages and faiths were united in their longing for a sustained and enduring ceasefire in Gaza; the organizing team worked hard over a period of 8 weeks to make the day the success that it was for everyone. Below are some photos and personal reflections from members of the organizing team and other participants that capture some of the energy and emotion of the day. Enjoy!

People sometimes travel great distances these days to make a pilgrimage- this was an opportunity to make one in our own home town. Working with a team planning the Gaza Ceasefire Pilgrimage and then walking it reminded me over and over again that I am here, I am alive and I have great privilege. With those privileges I feel I have a responsibility to stand up for the people of Gaza who don't have the freedoms I do and say 'I see you' - 'I know what is happening to you and it is wrong.' **Janet Gray**

From an organizer's point of view, it felt like we were on a roller-coaster ride at times. Because we hadn't worked together as a team, it was a journey of discovery too. The learning curve was steep at some points, having never organized a pilgrimage walk before. But all of us were determined to create a prayerful experience for United Churches to publicly witness their commitment to justice for the Palestinian people. And equally important to us was that this event offer the entire community a safe and accessible way to demonstrate their longing for peace. Without the support of the staff and ministry team at BVU as well as the leadership provided by Esquimalt, Fairfield, James Bay and Oak Bay United churches, this walk couldn't have happened. I am proud to have played a role in bringing it to life. May the seeds that were planted on March 16th, sprout and continue to grow here in Victoria as well as in Palestine/Israel. **Susan Draper**

I visited the West Bank a few years ago as a peace observer. As a settler occupying and living on the unceded lands of the Lekwennen, I witnessed an ongoing story of settler colonialism that echoes our own history here. Reconciliation with our own settler past is hard work. I grieve the present day genocide of Palestinians. I fervently hope my actions here will bring about a permanent ceasefire and a future for the people whose history and attachment to their ancestral land is reminiscent of indigenous people of Turtle Island. **Barbara Hansen**

I walked with a person who identified as a grandparent, for whom walking was not easy and who acknowledged they had never been involved in a walk for justice previously yet felt this one was important.

As the banner came into view, a visitor gave a thumbs up and said "I support that!" and had his girlfriend take a picture of him helping to hold the banner.

Thank you for your gifts and helping move us through paralysis to the next step.
